FROM THE RABBI

PESACH PREPARATIONS. Two of the most dreaded words that a Jew hears during the year. As soon as the festivities of Purim wind down, the month that is known for *simcha* – joy, turns into trepidation and anxiety. The cleaning, the kashering, the shopping, the decision of whom to invite, the cooking – they all loom in front of us. And this is being for what is supposed to be a holiday!

I write these words at the end of March, when according to an announcement made several weeks ago, we were supposed to witness a great moment of inspiration. NASA had announced that there will be the first ever all-women space walk. As the time for this momentous event neared, NASA announced that in reality there will be only one woman on that walk, and she will be joined in this scientific mission by a man, not a woman. The reason? There was only one medium size space suit on the International Space Station, and each of the women needed specifically that size.

The event had to be cancelled because of the lack of preparation!

The lesson is obvious. Anything worthwhile requires prior planning and preparation. Pesach is truly a momentous occasion and a great opportunity for spiritual growth. It is definitely a time when family gathers together allowing for the bonding of the multi-generational members and the growth of friendships and commitment to the Jewish community and the values of freedom.

These are moments of great opportunity and the preparation needed should not be considered a burden. Rather, all this hard work is necessary in order to achieve the uplifting celebration for which we yearn.

There are also other preparations that should be done if we want to achieve the spiritual uplift that we seek for the holiday. We also need to think about the messages we wish to convey to our grandchildren and guests. We should be planning how we will lead the seder and how we will impart to all the attendees the profundity of freedom, the necessity of unity in the Jewish community and the recognition of how God operates in our lives and in history. We need to plan the games that the little children will play to keep their attention and the thoughts that will be shared to keep the adults focused and involved.

We can choose to enter the seder wearing a space suit that may or may not fit and wing it from there. Or, we can choose to make this year's seder the most meaningful one that we have ever had.

From my family to yours, I wish you all a *chag kasher v'sameach* – may you have a joyous and kosher Pesach holiday.

Pesach Customs and Practices

When: Pesach begins on Friday, April 19th at night, and lasts through the day of Shabbat, April 27th.

Prohibition of Chametz: It is not only forbidden to eat *chametz* on Pesach, it is also forbidden to have *chametz* in our possession or in our sight. Therefore, a thorough **cleaning** of all places where chametz may be found is required by the night of <u>Thursday</u>, April 18. What is required is to clean all places where *chametz* may be found, used or stored in our homes, basement, pantries, offices, cars, purses and book bags. Don't forget your talit bag! Spring cleaning of rooms and areas that never have *chametz* there is not necessary. *Chametz* products that we are not consuming or throwing away before Pesach should be stored in a closed or covered cabinet. Dishes and utensils used for *chametz* should also be stored separately in order to avoid the mistaken use of these during Pesach.

Kitchen Preparation: We only use Pesach dishes, utensils and cookware on Pesach. The kitchen counters and appliances must be made Kosher for Pesach before any food for Passover is prepared in or on them. The **kashering** process differs for each appliance or utensil, and some may not be kashered at all. Please consult a reliable source for the laws and method of ka shering, and do not hesitate to ask the rabbi for assistance. Many of the major supervising agencies have kashering guides on their web sites. Kashering must be completed before you burn the *chametz*.

Shopping: Buy only products with a Kosher for Passover label from a reliable supervisory organization. The primary reliable agencies are the OU, the Star-K, the Chof-K, the OK, and KAJ. Many other supervisory agencies are also acceptable, but consult the rabbi before purchasing a product with a kashrut symbol that you do not know if it is acceptable. Many products can be used on Pesach without a special marking, and most of the kashrut agencies have lists of these on their web sites. When in doubt, please ask the rabbi for assistance.

Mechirat Chametz - Selling of the Chametz: The *chametz* that we have not consumed or disposed of before Pesach may not remain in our possession during the holiday. In order to avoid undue hardship or a large economic loss, arrangements can be made to sell the *chametz* to a non-Jew for the duration of the holiday. As indicated above, all *chametz* remaining in your home must be stored in a closed or covered cabinet. Non-Passover utensils can be stored separately since we do not need to sell these. In order to execute a legally and halachically binding sale, you must complete the authorization form found in this *ChaiLine* and submit it by 10:00 am on Friday, April 19. It is preferable to do this in person, but completed and signed forms submitted to the office, by mail, or by e-mail are also acceptable.

Bedikat Chametz – Search for Chametz: We check the house and search for any *chametz* that we may not have found during our cleaning after nightfall on Thursday, April 18. It is customary to place 10 pieces of *chametz* around the house prior to the search to make sure that our search is complete. Any *chametz* that we find during our search should be stored or disposed, except for that which we plan to burn the next morning. Before beginning the search we recite a blessing, and following the search we recite a statement of nullification for any *chametz* that we may not have found. The blessing and nullification can be found in a siddur or Haggadah.

Ta'anit Bechorim- Fast of the First Born: The fast of First Born is held on Erev Pesach, Friday, April 19, to commemorate their deliverance from death during the tenth plague in Egypt. It is customary for the first-born to participate in a meal served in celebration of a *mitzvah*, such as a *Brit Mila* (circumcision) or *siyum* (the completion of a tractate of the Talmud). Those who attend one of these events celebrate with the partaking of refreshments and are then exempt from this fast. A *siyum* will be held at Beth David following *Shacharit* services.

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Bi'ur Chametz – Burning the Chametz: It is prohibited to eat *chametz* on Erev Pesach, Friday, April 19 after 10:47 am. All *chametz* must be removed from our possession and the *chametz* found the night before during the search must be burned by 11:55 am. A statement of nullification of any *chametz* not found or disposed is recited at the time of burning. The statement can be found in a siddur or Hag-gadah.

Matzah and food on Erev Pesach: It is forbidden to eat matzah during the entire day of Erev Pesach is order that we may hunger for the taste of matzah at the Seder. Under some conditions, foods containing matzah meal may be eaten, as well as egg matzah, which we generally do not eat on Pesach. Please consult the rabbi for specifics. After 5:00 pm we may only eat small quantities of fruits, vegetables, meat, eggs or fish.

Seder Preparation: The special foods for the Seder plate for both *Sedarim* should be prepared during the day of Erev Pesach. The *Kiddush* at the Seder may not be recited until after nightfall on either night. The *afikoman* should be eaten before 1:02 AM. Some people have the custom of beginning *sefirat ha'omer* – the counting of the omer – at the second Seder instead of counting during the evening service.

Candle Lighting and Havdalah: Since the first night of Pesach is Friday night, candles must be lit by 7:30 pm and the blessing recited is *l'hadlik ner shel Shabbat v'shel Yom Tov*. The second night, candles are lit <u>after</u> 8:32 pm, and the blessing is *l'hadlik ner shel Yom Tov*, at which time preparations for the seder are permitted. Havdalah is incorporated into the Kiddush recited at the seder, as is found in the haggadah. Havdalah is recited on Sunday night after 8:33 pm, using only wine or grape juice. No candle or spices are used at this havdalah.

For the last days which begin on Thursday night, the blessing on the candles is *l'hadlik ner shel Yom tov*. On Friday night, April 26, candles must be lit by 7:38 pm and the blessing is *l'hadlik ner shel Shabbat v'shel Yom Tov*. Havdalah is not recited at all until after Shabbat on April 27, after 8:40 pm, and the standard havdalah for ending Shabbat is recited.

Eruv Tavshilin – The Mixing of Cooked Foods: The Biblical prohibition against labor on the Festivals specifically does not include the preparation or cooking of food. However, food may only be prepared for that day's use. When a *Yom Tov* falls on a Friday our Rabbis ruled that we are allowed to prepare food on the holiday for use on the Sabbath only if the preparation begins before the holiday. This is known as *Eruv Tavshilin*, or the "mixing of cooked foods", and is performed this year on the 4th day of Chol Hamoed, Thursday, April 25 for the last days of Pesach.

With a *matzah* and any cooked food in hand (such as fish or a hard boiled egg), we recite a blessing and declaration as is found in a siddur or Haggadah.

After Pesach: *Chametz* that was owned by a Jew during Pesach may not be consumed, even after Pesach. The *chametz* that you arranged to have been sold before Pesach will be returned to your possession at approximately 9:30 pm on Saturday, April 27. Price Chopper is Jewish owned and arranged for its *chametz* to be sold to a non-Jew through the Albany Vaad Hakashrut. Weis Markets is Jewish owned and the *chametz* in all the local stores was sold by me, while the stores in other areas have been arranged with other rabbis. The *chametz* at the local JCC, Hillel Academy and our synagogue was sold by me.

This information is accurate as of time of publication. If there are any changes which will affect the ability to purchase or consume *chametz* from or at any of these businesses, I will inform the congregation by e-mail. *If you do not receive e-mail updates from the synagogue, please send a request to <u>rabbisilber@stny.rr.com</u> to be added to our distribution list.* The Sisterhood Purim meeting held on March 13 was enjoyed very much by those who attended. Co-President, Cathy Velenchik, used Google to put together a Purim program that was presented by Toby Kohn, Kathie Shelly, and Cathy Velenchik. They each read items along with the proper gestures and voices that put us in a humorous mood. The refreshments included shul baked hamantashen prepared by Lori Tuberman and her crew.
