FROM THE RABBI

Another name that the Torah uses for the holiday of Passover is *Chag HaAviv* – the spring holiday. The rabbis understood this appellation as a requirement that Pesach be observed in the spring season. We know that the Jewish lunar calendar is much shorter than the solar calendar, therefore we add an extra month every few years before the month of Nisan, an extra Adar, in order to make sure that Pesach coincides with the spring season. Since Pesach this year falls in March, next year will be a leap year in the Jewish calendar so that Pesach is in the spring.

Pesach being in the spring does not only have a seasonal significance. It is also related to the entire purpose of the celebration.

Commemorating the Exodus from the Egyptian slavery and the formation of the Jewish people and nation, we are also celebrating the idea of renewal and growth. The earth has been dormant for months, nothing is growing, fields are barren, trees are bare, and the landscape looks deathly. Suddenly, as the sun shines stronger and the atmosphere warms, we notice a rebirth of life and beauty begins to reemerge from the darkness and coldness of winter.

So it is with the Jewish people. From the darkness of slavery Pesach celebrates our yearly rebirth and flourishing of Jewish life. This is true in a historical perspective as well. Most recently we suffered the great destruction of the Holocaust and we have been reborn with the reestablishment of Jewish life and sovereignty in Israel which occurred during the spring and we will celebrate just a short time after Pesach.

In our own times, today in 2021, we are still consumed by the tragedy of the COVID epidemic and the world seems very dark. Yet, this Pesach, we are witnessing the slow rebirth of personal and communal life. This spring, even though we are unable to open our beloved synagogue for services yet, we begin to see that this may very well happen sooner than later, perhaps even in late spring.

We are vaccinating ourselves against this dreaded disease, we keep masking and distancing to protect ourselves and others from illness, and we pray and hope that these efforts will allow us to celebrate a return to normal – a spring of rebirth.

We should all prepare now for the upcoming renewal and growth of our Jewish life and observances. Plan to return to shul, think about ways that we can together make our synagogue a better, happier, and more active institution as we work together to strengthen Jewish life and values.

Please share your ideas with me!

Maot Chitim - Passover Charity

We all know how expensive it is to purchase all our Pesach foods and needs. We cannot forget that we have an obligation to help those less economically able to do their own purchases and enjoy the Seder and the holiday. This special charity to provide for Jewish poor the ability to purchase Pesach provisions is called Maot Chitim.

Beth David and Jewish Family Service are working together to provide for the needs of local poor. In order to assure that the money is available to enable the poor to shop before Pesach, we ask that you send your check no later than Friday, March 19. Checks may be made payable to Beth David Synagogue Rabbi's Discretionary Fund or to Jewish Family Service, noting that it is for Passover Charity. Checks may be mailed to the office of either organization.

Please do not hesitate to text or email Rabbi Silber with a pledge for this purpose if you cannot get the check to the shul office before these deadlines, and he will advance the funds on your behalf

Pesach Customs and Practices

When: Pesach begins on Saturday, March 27th at night, and lasts through the day of Sunday, April 4th.

Prohibition of *Chametz*: It is not only forbidden to eat *chametz* on Pesach, it is also forbidden to have *chametz* in our possession or in our sight. Therefore, a thorough *cleaning* of all places where chametz may be found is required by the night of <u>Thursday</u>, March 25. What is required is to clean all places where *chametz* may be found, used or stored in our homes, basement, pantries, offices, cars, purses and book bags. Don't forget your talit bag! Spring cleaning of rooms and areas that never have *chametz* there is not necessary. *Chametz* products that we are not consuming or throwing away before Pesach should be stored in a closed or covered cabinet. Dishes and utensils used for *chametz* should also be stored separately in order to avoid the mistaken use of these during Pesach.

Kitchen Preparation: We only use Pesach dishes, utensils and cookware on Pesach. The kitchen counters and appliances must be made Kosher for Pesach before any food for Passover is prepared in or on them. The **kashering** process differs for each appliance or utensil, and some may not be koshered at all. Please consult a reliable source for the laws and method of koshering, and do not hesitate to ask the rabbi for assistance. Many of the major supervising agencies have kashering guides on their web sites. Kashering must be completed before you burn the *chametz*.

Shopping: Buy only products with a Kosher for Passover label from a reliable supervisory organization. The primary reliable agencies are the OU, the Star-K, the Chof-K, the OK, and KAJ. Many other supervisory agencies are also acceptable, but consult the rabbi before purchasing a product with a kashrut symbol that you do not know if it is acceptable. Many products can be used on Pesach without a special marking, and most of the kashrut agencies have lists of these on their web sites. When in doubt, please ask the rabbi for assistance.

Mechirat Chametz - **Selling of the Chametz**: The *chametz* that we have not consumed or disposed of before Pesach may not remain in our possession during the holiday. In order to avoid undue hardship or a large economic loss, arrangements can be made to sell the *chametz* to a non-Jew for the duration of the holiday. As indicated above, all *chametz* remaining in your home must be stored in a closed or covered cabinet. Non-Passover utensils can be stored separately since we do not need to sell these. In order to execute a legally and halachically binding sale, you must complete the authorization form found in this *ChaiLine* and submit it by 10:00 am on Friday, March 26. **Forms are included with this ChaiLine and they should be printed, completed, signed and dated, and sent by e-mail to rabbisilber@stny.rr.com or mailed to the shul office or put into the shul mail slot. Please do this as soon as possible. The sooner, the better!**

Bedikat Chametz - **Search for Chametz**: We check the house and search for any *chametz* that we may not have found during our cleaning after nightfall on **Thursday, March 25**. It is customary to place 10 pieces of *chametz* around the house prior to the search to make sure that our search is complete. Any *chametz* that we ⁿ ind during our search should be stored or disposed, except for that which we plan *to eat on Friday and Shabbat* or burn the next morning. Before beginning the search we recite a blessing, and following the search we recite a statement of nullification for any *chametz* that we may not have found. The blessing and nullification can be found in a siddur or Haggadah.

Ta'anit Bechorim- Fast of the First Born: The fast of First Born is usually held on Erev Pesach. Since Erev Pesach this year is on Shabbat, the fast is observed on Thursday, March 25. The first born are required to fast in order to commemorate their deliverance from death during the tenth plague in Egypt. It is customary for the first-born to participate in a meal served in celebration of a mitzvah, such as a Brit Mila (circumcision) or siyum (the completion of a tractate of the Talmud). Those who attend one of these events celebrate with the partaking of refreshments and are then exempt from this fast. If the shul is open for services, the siyum will be held at Beth David following Shacharit services. If we are not reopened yet, I will conduct a siyum on ZOOM at 9:00 am. An update on which we will do will be sent by e-mail in the weekly update.

Pesach Customs and Practices (Continued)

Bi'ur Chametz - Burning the Chametz: The burning of the chametz is usually done on Erev Pesach. However, since Erev Pesach occurs on Shabbat this year, this is done on Friday, March 26. It is customary to burn the chametz that we have not sold nor have set aside to eat the rest of the day and for the Shabbat meals on Friday night and early Shabbat morning at the time that it is usually burned on Erev Pesach that occurs during the week. This year we should burn the chametz before 12:06 pm. If you are unable to burn it at that time, it may be burned later that day, but before the beginning of Shabbat. The statement of nullification usually recited at that time is not recited this year at the time of burning. Rather, it will be recited on Shabbat morning, as detailed below.

Matzah and food on Erev Pesach: It is forbidden to eat matzah during the entire day of Erev Pesach is order that we may hunger for the taste of matzah at the Seder. Under some conditions, foods containing matzah meal may be eaten, as well as egg matzah, which we generally do not eat on Pesach. Please consult the rabbi for specifics. After 4:16 pm we may only eat small quantities of fruits, vegetables, meat, eggs or fish. Since Erev Pesach occurs on Shabbat, and we have an obligation to eat *shalosh seudot* – three meals that include bread, special care and planning must be made in advance to enable the proper observance of Shabbat laws and Pesach laws.

Some will avoid all *chametz* this Shabbat and make the required *hamotzie* on egg matzah. Others will have small *chametz* rolls for that requirement. Care and special laws must be followed in disposing of any left over food and *chametz*.

It is prohibited to eat *chametz* on Erev Pesach, Shabbat, March 27, after 11:04 am. All *chametz* must then be removed from our possession and the statement of nullification, found in a siddur or Haggadah, is recited before 12:06 pm. What foods are permitted to be eaten for the rest of the day, including for the "third meal" (*seudah shelishit*) were discussed at the ZOOM Sisterhood meeting. Contact the Rabbi if you have questions. **Please note that no preparation for the Seder, including setting the table, may be done on Shabbat until after the conclusion of Shabbat at 8:06 pm and a** *havdalah* **statement (***baruch hamavdil bein kodesh***) is recited.**

Seder Preparation: The special foods for the Seder plate for both *Sedarim* should be prepared during the day of <u>Friday</u>, <u>March 26</u>. Yom Tov candles may not be lit and the *Kiddush* at the Seder may not be recited until after nightfall on either night. The *a@koman* should be eaten before 1:08 AM. Some people have the custom of beginning *se@rat ha'omer* – the counting of the omer – at the second Seder instead of counting during the evening service.

After Pesach: Chametz that was owned by a Jew during Pesach may not be consumed, even after Pesach. The chametz that you arranged to have been sold before Pesach will be returned to your possession at approximately 9:15 pm on Sunday, April 4. Many of the local supermarkets are not owned by Jews and kosher chametz products may be purchased immediately following Pesach. Price Chopper is Jewish owned and arranged for its chametz to be sold to a non-Jew through the Albany Vaad Hakashrut. Weis Markets is Jewish owned and the chametz in all the local stores was sold by me, while the stores in other areas have been arranged with other rabbis. The chametz at the local JCC, Hillel Academy and our synagogue was sold by me.

This information is accurate as of time of publication. If there are any changes which will affect the ability to purchase or consume *chametz* from or at any of these businesses, I will inform the congregation by e-mail. *If you do not receive e-mail updates from the synagogue, please send a request to <u>rabbisilber@stny.rr.com</u> to be added to our distribution list.*

On Tuesday, April 27 at 7:00 pm. Temple Israel will be hosting the 2021 InterSisterhood Program on Zoom. Once a year the three Broome County Sisterhoods, Temple Israel, Beth David Synagogue and Temple Concord share a program. This year, artist and educator Maxine Rosenberg, will be teaching an English Paper Piecing project entitled Kiddish Cup Coaster for Shabbat. Materials needed for the project will be assembled by the InterSisterhood program organizers, and will be available for signed-up participants ahead of the event. Signing up for the event is essential, organizers say, so that there is enough time to assemble the individual packets of necessary materials for each participant. To sign up for this program, please RSVP by Thursday, April 22, 2021 to Temple Israel's Secretary Tammy at (607) 723-7461. Out of town participants need to respond by April 16 in order to receive their packets by mail on time. Once registered, members will need to pick up their packets at Temple Israel, 4737 Deerfield Place, Vestal, NY 13850 on April 23 or April 26. Participants will be sent the Zoom meeting ID for logging in to the event.

Each packet will include the following: an explanation of EPP; a page of shapes to be cut out accurately for the project; fabric pieces larger than the EPP shapes; batting and squares of fabric for the background and back of the coaster; and a special "big eye" needle designed for EPP.

Participants will need to have on hand the following: thread (polyester [better] or cotton); scissors that will cut cotton fabric; a glue stick; a 6 or 12-inch ruler; a pencil; an iron and an ironing surface.
